## **REPORT BY HEAD OF PLANNING, ECONOMIC DEVELOPMENT & REGENERATION**

## A. PURPOSE OF REPORT

The purpose of this report is to present West Lothian Council with the recommendations from the Cross-Party Climate Emergency Working Group.

## B. RECOMMENDATION

It is recommended that West Lothian Council:

- 1. notes the contents of the report, and;
- 2. agrees the recommendations and proposals put forward by the cross-party Climate Emergency Working Group which are set out in Appendix 2.

## D. TERMS OF REPORT

#### D.1 Background

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As part of the Climate Emergency Declaration approved on 24 September 2019, it was agreed that a Cross-Party Climate Emergency Working Group would be established. The agreed motion establishing the group is attached as Appendix 1.

The remit of the group was agreed at a meeting of Council Executive on 22 October 2019. The remit is to formulate a way forward which involves the wider public, business and other public bodies.

The group has met monthly since November 2019 to discuss some of the key issues relating to Climate Change and how the council and the wider West Lothian community can move towards a net-zero carbon future. The group has considered and discussed a number of reports and presentations on a range of subjects including transport, energy use in our buildings and options for the participation of young people in the consideration of the climate emergency.

## D.2 Climate Emergency Declaration

The Climate Emergency Declaration noted a number of specific points and agreed a series of actions as follows. An update on each action is set out below.

#### PDSP Reporting

The motion noted that a number of reports were planned for Environment PDSP including a revised Climate Change Strategy and Carbon Management Plan. A revised strategy and associated reports will be prepared for consideration by PDSP but the timescale for this will be reviewed to ensure that full account of the agreed actions within the declaration, including the development of a set of performance indicators and format for quarterly reporting on progress incorporation within the revised strategy as per the details set out in Appendix 2 to this report.

Three specific reports to the Environment PDSP as follows:

- options for moving the council minibus fleet to all electric or bio-diesel, including timescales and the potential investment required.
- Options for improving energy efficiency of the key council buildings, and the investment that would be required in order to significantly improve efficiency in each
- identifying the extent of the current electric car charging network in West Lothian, where the gaps are, and recommending the best strategy to ensure a "joined up" fast-charging network, with sufficient capacity for the growth in electric car usage, is installed in the county.

The anticipated timescale for reporting on each of these subject areas is set out in Appendix 2.

#### Follow on Seminar and Engagement with Young People

The agreed motion noted the on-going involvement of the Community Planning Partnership and noted the proposal to hold a further workshop. This follow up workshop took place on 7 October at Howden Park Centre and was attended by a number of stakeholders, including secondary school pupils who were active participants in the discussions held. Feedback from the workshop was very positive and the points raised on the day will feed in to the development of the new Local Outcomes Improvement Plan.

Proposals for further engagement are set out in Appendix 2 including specific proposals for on-going engagement with young people.

#### Letter to the First Minister Seeking Additional Powers and Resources

The Chief Executive wrote to the First Minister on 2 October A response was received from Roseanna Cunningham on 29 October. A copy of that response is attached as Appendix 3.

#### D3 Summary Recommendations and Proposals

A draft list of recommendations and proposals to address Climate Emergency is attached at Appendix 2. Central to the discussion at the group was setting a target date for our own emissions and the wider West Lothian community to be net-zero. There was a consensus in the group that the target could be no later than the national target of 2045. The group discussed if there should be a single target covering all of West Lothian or if the council should be more ambitious and set an earlier target for its own activities achieving net carbon zero.

The Climate Change Strategy will be the key driver for the council and the Community Planning Partnership and will set out how we will achieve net-zero carbon across all themes, including through the use of carbon offsetting. However, any target, while challenging, must be achievable and further work is required in order to inform any target for the council and / or West Lothian. The work will look at both the reduction of the council's carbon production and also options to offset the impacts of the carbon which will continue to be produced as a result of the council's activities in the short to medium term.

The strategy will be supported and underpinned by a new Carbon Management Plan which will be reviewed annually and refreshed every 5 years to ensure that progress is rigorously monitored and the trajectory towards net-zero is being maintained. If, in the development of the Climate Change Strategy and Carbon Management Plan it can be established that emissions from the council's activities can be net-zero carbon prior to 2045, this earlier target will be put to Council Executive for approval in due course.

Within the framework of a new Climate Change Strategy and Carbon Management Plan a significant number of ideas came forward from the group. These are set out in Appendix 2 and where indicated will be picked up as actions within the framework of the revised Climate Change Strategy. Reports will be presented to the relevant PDSP's with a quarterly update on progress to the Environment PDSP.

## E. CONCLUSION

The recommendations being put forward by the Cross-Party Working Group will ensure that the council develops a clear and considered path to net-zero carbon, both for its own emissions and those of the wider West Lothian area.

## Appendix 1 – Agreed Motion

Council notes the impacts of climate change highlighted in the Report on Global Warming published by the Intergovernmental Panel on Climate Change (IPCC) in October 2018 and the devastation that an average rise of 2 degrees C in global temperatures is likely to cause.

Council recognises that the world is in the midst of a climate emergency which requires urgent and meaningful action at international, national and local level in order to safeguard our planet for future generations.

Council further agrees that having more environmentally progressive policies can lead to improved health, high quality jobs and more sustainable communities.

Council notes that West Lothian Council signed the Climate Change Declaration in 2007. Council further notes the significant work to date to make West Lothian a more environmentally friendly and sustainable place to live and work, and that the Council's agreed carbon reduction targets are already being exceeded.

Council recognises the climate emergency declared by the UK parliament and councils across the United Kingdom. Council declares a climate emergency and:

- Notes that reports are scheduled for the Environment PDSP on the revised Climate Change Strategy, Carbon Management Plan, UK Climate Change Plan, Local Climate Impact profile and the West Lothian Adaptation Plan

- Agrees that as part of the review of the reports noted above, due consideration be given to a) realistic targets to further reduce the carbon footprint with the aim of setting a net zero target b) how environmental considerations can be built into Council processes and procedures

- Agrees that proposals to the PDSP should include quarterly reports on progress against agreed indicators, partnership working and actions and achievements through the CPP, engagement and partnership with local businesses, third sector organisations and local communities

Instruct officers to:-

• Bring a report to the relevant PDSPs detailing what it would take to move the council minibus fleet to all electric or bio-diesel, including timescales and potential investment required.

• Bring a report to the relevant PDSPs identifying the energy efficiency of the key council buildings, and what investment would be required in order to significantly improve building efficiency in each, noting this could be achieved by energy efficiency investment in green energy generation.

• Bring a report to the relevant PDSPs identifying the extent of the current electric car charging network I West Lothian, where the gaps are, and recommend the best strategy to ensure a "joined up" fast-charging network, with sufficient capacity for the growth in electric car usage, is installed in the county. This should include the actions West Lothian Council can take, and the asks of the Scottish Government and other bodies.

- Notes the partnership approach being taken through the Community Planning Partnership and agrees with the CPP Board's decision on 2 September 2019 that a follow on seminar/conference is organised by council officers in conjunction with community planning partners

- Instructs officers to engage with the young people of West Lothian to ensure they are represented and given the opportunity to participate in the seminar/conference noted above

• Agrees that a short-term cross-party group (2 SNP, 2 Labour and 2 Conservative) is established to formulate a way forward which involves the wider pubic (Citizens Panel), business and other public bodies to report back to council in 3 months with proposals, which would include the cost implications of such action and the initiative to be community led

- Instructs the Chief Executive to write to the First Minister to seek sufficient resources and new powers for local authorities to enable local government to play a full role and to meet its obligations in tackling the climate emergency.
